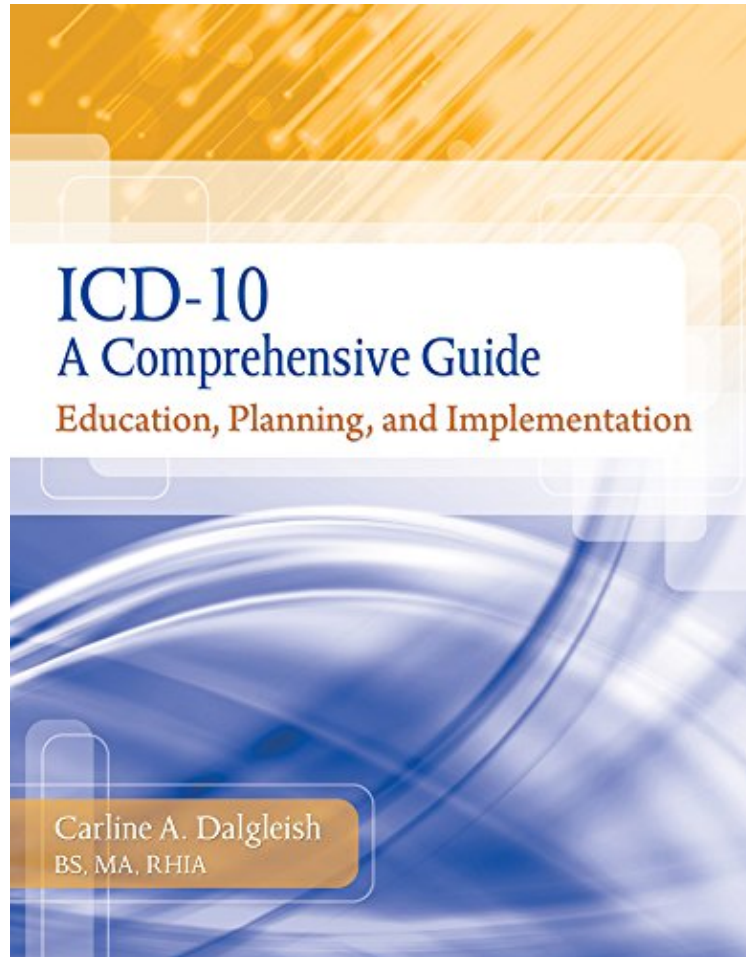

Did anyone edit it at all? If it weren't a textbook, the typos would merely be annoying, but they become problematic if you're trying to learn something from the book. For example, none of the options for multiple choice question #10 at the end of Chapter 2 are correct. I spent a good chunk of my study time trying to figure out if I was reading the tables (referred to in the question) incorrectly, or if there was a mistake in the text. And if it were a mistake, was it in the question or the table? As it turns out, both the table and the question had typos. I'm only on Chapter 4 so far, and I'm finding it really frustrating. I'm going to suggest to my professor that she find a different book to use for this course in the future.
