How To Build A Code For Diabetes
Choose a number from each column until you reach a green box, at which point the code is complete. Valid codes may have four characters (E11.9), or as many as six (E11.331). Codes in red boxes represent additional diagnoses that may be required to complete reporting of a condition. Use additional code to identify any insulin use (Z79.4).

NOS: Not otherwise specified. Documentation does not identify the specificity of the diagnosis.
* Categories E10, E11, and E11.1 may require an additional code to identify the cause of the diabetes.
